In the late 70's and early 80's, Tom O'Reilly's pub on Park Avenue South in Manhattan was one of the few places where you could rely on hearing some great traditional music. Official closing time was 4.00 am, but that was interpreted to mean that nobody else could enter after that time - folks already inside weren't bothered (this included local cops and the "professionally indiscreet" business ladies who could come in from the cold, have a drink at the bar, and not be bothered). Tom O'Reilly's is long gone - I haven't been in Manhattan in many years, so I'm not sure what's there now - but it certainly remains a fond memory for a lot of musicians.
